In the winter time, the city would build a skating rink down at South Park and we could check out hockey skates to play hockey or skate at the rink. The skates were old and well used, but without them, tennis shoes were the next best thing. My best memory of the Club was that it was a safe place to escape, if only for a few hours, and I know my parents had comfort in that.

What are you up to now? Job? Family?

I have four wonderful children and have been married to my beautiful wife for 25 years. We live in Lewiston, Idaho and have seven awesome grandchildren. I served in the Army, worked in law enforcement for several years, and now work as a Production Supervisor for the largest manufacturer of ammunition - CCI/ Speer.
